



Mission Possible: When Initiative Meets Teamwork

The alarm buzzed in the control room. A message flashed on the big screen: "Warning: Communication system disabled. Mission in danger." It felt like something straight out of a spy movie, but it was real. Our team had been preparing for weeks to present a project at an interschool science event. The project was based on a voice-controlled drone, and without the communication system, everything would collapse.

For a moment, silence filled the room. The challenge seemed too big. But then the spark of teamwork lit up. Instead of panicking, we decided to treat it like a mission report — calm, precise, and focused.

The first step was investigation. We checked every wire, every button, and every tiny part of the system. Nothing seemed broken; the problem was hidden somewhere deeper. That's when one of us realised the voice recognition software was not responding because of too many background noises.

Now came the second step — strategy. We split roles quickly. One of us shut down unnecessary devices that created noise. Another adjusted the microphone settings. A third tested the drone's backup commands. I kept track of the steps and made sure no one gave up.

It was not easy. The drone failed again and again. Each time it dropped, it felt like the mission was over. But each failure taught us something new. We adjusted our pitch, slowed our commands, and finally discovered that the system worked best when our voices were steady and clear.

At last, the moment arrived. We gave the final command together — firm, confident, and united. The drone rose smoothly into the air, lights blinking proudly. The communication system responded, and the mission was saved. The audience clapped, but for us, the applause was not the main victory. The real success was the lesson we carried: teamwork and initiative can turn the most impossible mission into "Mission Possible."

THE BIG IDEA: TURNING CURIOSITY INTO INNOVATION

Science begins with a question, but it comes alive through action. This year, I worked on designing a mini prototype of an "earthquake simulator" — a device that can generate earthquake simulators. The idea was inspired by the need for sustainable solutions in a world struggling with climate change. Using simple scientific principles of air compression and recycled plastic bottles, I created a model that reduced the room temperature by a few degrees naturally.

What amazed me most was how a simple science experiment turned into a practical innovation. It showed me that leadership in science is not about having a laboratory full of equipment, but about having the courage to apply knowledge to real problems.

This project also motivated my classmates to think differently —some started experimenting with solar chargers, while others researched water filters made from natural materials. Together, we realized that every small step in science is a big leap towards a sustainable future.

Science is not just a subject in our textbooks; it is our voice in action — a way to create, to lead, and to inspire change.





Q. If you had to describe your journey from Ralli to IIIT Kota in just three words, what would they be? What's one school memory that still motivates you whenever you look back?


My journey in three words: Struggle, Patience, Fun. One school memory that still motivates me is our Annual Function in class 10 — it always reminds me of teamwork and joy.

• Consequence: Your peer becomes more mindful, and others notice your initiative.


